Program Description

Project FAIR is collaboration between the Bureau of Substance Abuse, Prevention, Treatment & Recovery, and The Michigan Department of Human Services.

The program offers substance abuse treatment screenings and referrals to parents or guardians that have child protective service involvement due to substance abuse.

Clients are directed for services through the child protective service worker or foster Care worker.

Participants must meet eligibility requirements. Participants must be city of Detroit Residents with Medicaid insurance, non-insured or underinsured.

Substance abuse screenings are offered by telephone or walk in services. Treatment services are offered the same day. This program greatly assists individuals with Maintaining their family unit and/or family reunification.

Referral Process

- Fax to Project FAIR Liaison
- Sign release with Provider
- Develop Treatment Plan

CHART OF CHILD PROTECTIVE PROCEEDINGS TIME FRAMES

<p>Preliminary Hearing Conduct within 24 hours if child in custody, excluding Sundays and holidays unless adjourned for good cause. See MCR 3.965 (A)(1).</p>
<p>Prelim/Plene Proceeding Timing at discretion of court.</p>
<p>Trial If child IS in placement, must commence as soon as possible, but no later than 63 days after the child is placed by court unless the trial is postponed. See MCR 3.972(A). If child is NOT in placement, must be held within 6 months after the filing of the petition unless adjourned for good cause. See MCR 3.972(A).</p>
<p>Initial Dispositional Hearing Within 35 days of trial, except for good cause. See MCR 3.973.</p>
<p>Dispositional Review Hearing Child At Home FIRST YEAR The progress of the child must be reviewed no later than 182 days from the date a petition is filed, and no later than every 91 days after that for the first year that the child is under the jurisdiction of the court. See MCL 712A.19(2). AFTER FIRST YEAR The progress of the child must be reviewed no later than 182 days from each preceding review until case is dismissed. See MCL 712A.19(3). Child Removed From Home FIRST YEAR The progress of the child must be reviewed no later than 182 days after the child removal from his or her home, and no later than every 91 days after that for the first year. See MCL 712A.19(3). AFTER FIRST YEAR The progress of the child must be reviewed no later than 182 days from the immediately preceding review hearing before the end of that first year, and no later than every 182 days from each preceding review hearing until the case is dismissed. See MCL 712A.19(3). Child Is Permanently Placed With a Relative or Child Is In A Permanent Foster Family Agreement The progress of the child must be reviewed no later than 182 days after the child has been removed from his or her home, and no later than every 182 days after so long as the child is under the court's jurisdiction. See MCL 712A.19(4).</p>
<p>Permanency Planning Hearing FIRST YEAR Within 12 months from the date that the child was originally removed from the home. See MCL 712A.19c(1). AFTER FIRST YEAR Within 12 months of the preceding permanency planning hearing. See MCL 712A.19e(1).</p>
<p>Termination of Parental Rights Commence no later than 42 days of petition; must conclude within 70 days. See MCR 3.977, MCL 71219b(1).</p>
<p>Post Termination Review FIRST YEAR Must be held no later than 91 days after the termination of parental rights, and no later than 91 days after that hearing for the first year following termination of parental rights. See MCL 712A.19c(1). AFTER FIRST YEAR Must be held no later than 182 days from the immediately preceding review hearing before the end of the first year, and no later than every 182 days from each preceding review hearing until the case is dismissed. See MCL 712A.19c(1).</p>

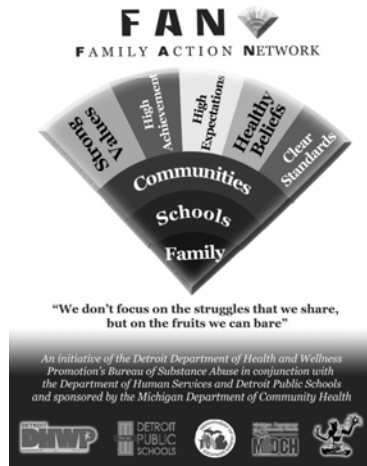

How the System Works

- FAN uses the Student Assistance Program, endorsed by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Administration (SAMSHA), to identify youth who are at highest risk of academic failure, drop out and drug use.
- Youth and families are identified by the FRC coordinator, parents, teachers, or self referral.
- A core team within each school reviews referral on a case by case basis.
- Appropriate resources, referrals, and assistance are provided to youth and family.

Services Provided to Youth and Families

- Individual counseling and group therapy sessions provided by licensed clinicians.
- Curriculum guided family sessions using Strengthening Families and Children of Addicted Parents.
- Resource referrals for additional services.
