## **Considering a Legal Career?**

Learn about the legal profession like a law student by presenting a moot court case as if before the Supreme Court.

- Meet members of the judiciary, attorneys, and law students.
- Practice professional skills, such as critical thinking and public speaking, which are essential for any career.

### **Dates & Locations**

#### JUNE 24-28 — LANSING

During this week-long program, students will sharpen their research, writing, and public speaking skills with the guidance of law students, attorneys, and court staff. Activities will include guest speakers, presentations, small group discussions, writing labs, and practice sessions. Each day's activities lead up to arguments in the Michigan Supreme Court courtroom.

Sessions are 9 a.m.—12:30 p.m. at the **Hall of Justice**, **925 West Ottawa Street**. Registration is limited to 24 students.

Drones & the Fourth Amendment | The local government, the plaintiff, used an unmanned drone to take aerial photos of property owned by the defendants without their prior permission. The government relied on those photos to sue the defendants, alleging that they violated local laws and a prior settlement agreement between the parties. Is this allowed under the Fourth Amendment, or did the plaintiff violate the defendants' constitutional protections against unreasonable search and seizure? Should the evidence be excluded?

#### JULY 26 - DETROIT

In this one-day program, students learn about the legal questions in the case before they outline and present their arguments in a courtroom, guided by law students, attorneys, and court staff. Activities will also include guest speakers, small group discussions, and practice sessions.

Session is 9 a.m.—3 p.m. at the **Coleman A. Young Municipal Center, 2 Woodward Avenue.** Registration is limited to 24 students.
