2019 Problem-Solving Courts Training Calendar

1/14/2019 Juvenile Mental Health Court and Juvenile Drug Court Forum (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This forum is intended for all juvenile mental health court and juvenile drug court team members. Topics for discussion, in small and large groups, will focus on common issues that impact participants and operations of juvenile problem-solving court programs.

4/11/2019 DCCMIS Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

DCCMIS Training is designed for anyone who enters data for a drug, sobriety, hybrid, family dependency, juvenile, veterans treatment court, or mental health court. Swift and Sure team members who enter data might also benefit from this training. The computer training room at the Hall of Justice provides the opportunity for hands-on, beginner training. Class participants will go through the entire process of entering and tracking data – from the initial screening process to discharge from the program. Additionally, the training includes an administration component, so courts can learn how to best use DCCMIS for each member of the team. The class also covers some short cuts in DCCMIS, including using bulk tasks and available reports.

4/23/2019 Applying Standards and Best Practices to Promote Effective Outcomes (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is intended for team members from adult drug court programs (which include drug, sobriety, hybrid, family dependency, and Tribal Healing-To-Wellness programs), adult mental health court programs, and veterans treatment court programs. The training sessions will focus on matching risk and needs to services and monitoring; incorporating therapeutic sanctions and incentives; team communication and cohesion; implementing proper drug testing practices; and bridging the gap between court and treatment. All team members are welcome to attend, however, it's recommended that attendees include the program judge, a treatment provider, and at least one additional team member.

5/22/2019 Applying Standards and Best Practices to Promote Effective Outcomes (Bay College, Escanaba, Michigan)

This training is intended for team members from adult drug court programs (which include sobriety, hybrid, family dependency, and Tribal Healing-to-Wellness programs), adult mental health court programs, and veterans treatment court programs. The training sessions will focus on matching risk and needs to services and monitoring; incorporating therapeutic sanctions and incentives; team communication and cohesion; implementing proper drug testing practices; and bridging the gap between court and treatment. All team members are welcome to attend, however it's recommended that attendees include the program judge, a treatment provider, and at least one additional team member.

**6/3/2019-6/4/2019 YLS Risk and Needs Assessment Tool Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)**

The Youth Level of Service (YLS) end-user training is for juvenile drug court team members or staff who will be administering the YLS risk and needs assessment to clients referred to the juvenile drug court, and to active participants for regular reassessment of progress in the program. This training, which is required to allow a person to administer the YLS, is specifically for juvenile drug court personnel who will be administering the tool.

**6/18/2019 DCAS Basic Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)**

This training is for new users and those needing a refresher. Attendees will learn how to navigate the system, run simple statistics and interpret the output, build study groups, and use data to measure program performance. Attendees should have had prior DCCMIS training.

**6/19/2019 SSSPP Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)**

This training is designed for all Swift and Sure Sanctions Probation Program team members. Training sessions will focus on topics relevant to the operations of a Swift and Sure court.

**7/23/2019 Drug Court Networking Forum
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)**

The Drug Court Networking Forum is an event open to anyone involved with a drug, sobriety, hybrid, or family dependency treatment court in Michigan. Attendees are given the opportunity to network and share ideas, and to discuss topics in treatment courts. The format will include small and large group discussions.

**8/01/2019 DCCMIS Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)**

DCCMIS Training is designed for anyone who enters data for a drug, sobriety, hybrid, family dependency, juvenile, veterans treatment court, or mental health court. Swift and Sure team members who enter data might also benefit from this training. The computer training room at the Hall of Justice provides the opportunity for hands-on, beginner training. Class participants will go through the entire process of entering and tracking data – from the initial screening process to discharge from the program. Additionally, the training includes an administration component, so courts can learn how to best use DCCMIS for each member of the team. **8/07/2019 Adult Problem-Solving Court Topic Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)**

This training is designed for all problem-solving court team members. Training sessions will focus on topics pertinent to the operations of adult problem-solving courts and participant needs.

9/10/2019 DCAS Basic Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is for new users and those needing a refresher. Attendees will learn how to navigate the system, run simple statistics and interpret the output, build study groups, and use data to measure program performance. Attendees should have had prior DCCMIS training.

9/25/2019 Problem-Solving Courts (PSC) Judicial Leadership Workshop
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)

Research indicates that the role of the judge is a key element to the success of problem-solving courts. Judge Patrick Bowler will present on motivational interviewing and important topics regarding judicial leadership. This training is for PSC judges only. Judges will have the opportunity to discuss relevant topics in small and large groups. New research and recent case law make this training essential for both new and experienced PSC judges.

10/23/2019 Fundamentals of Problem-Solving Courts
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)

The training will focus on the basic fundamentals of developing and implementing a problem solving court for each program type (drug, sobriety, hybrid, family dependency, juvenile, veterans treatment court, and mental health court). Training and discussion will be in large group and small breakout sessions. This training is targeted for new problem-solving court teams.

10/29/2019 Veterans Treatment Court Forum
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)

The Veterans Court Forum is an event open to anyone who works with a Veterans Treatment Court in Michigan. Attendees are given the opportunity to network and share ideas, and to discuss hot topics regarding veteran's affairs, treatment courts, and the criminal justice system. There will be small-group discussion and plenary sessions.

11/06/2019 Process and Outcomes Evaluation Training
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training will cover performance measures for drug, veterans treatment, and mental health courts; it will also explain the differences between a process evaluation and an outcomes evaluation, and describe how data applies to each type of evaluation. Attendees must be knowledgeable about the Drug Court Analytic System (DCAS) database and its variables; however, this is NOT a DCAS training. Those that will benefit most from this training are users of DCAS for progress reporting, and those that are responsible for compiling data about their program for their team and/or community.

11/07/2019 Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)
(Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training will cover an overview of Medication Assisted Treatment, integrating MAT's into problem solving court, MAT guidelines, and MAT outcomes.

11/21/2019 Adult Mental Health Court Networking Forum (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

The Mental Health Court Networking Forum is open to all adult mental health court team members. Topics for discussion, in large and small groups, will focus on common issues that impact participants and operations of adult mental health courts. This is a great opportunity to network, share ideas, and problem solve among peers.

12/3/2019 DCCMIS Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

DCCMIS Training is primarily designed for anyone who enters data for a drug, sobriety, hybrid, family dependency, juvenile, veterans treatment court, or mental health court. Swift and Sure team members who enter data might also benefit from this training. The computer training room at the Hall of Justice provides the opportunity for hands-on, beginner training. Class participants will go through the entire process of entering and tracking data – from the initial screening process to discharge from the program. Additionally, the training includes an administration component, so courts can learn how to best use DCCMIS for each member of the team. The class also covers some short cuts in DCCMIS, including using bulk tasks and available reports.

12/6/2019 Federal Grant Management and Reporting Requirements Training (Hall of Justice, Lansing)

This training is intended for anyone who is involved with the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne JAG) and/or Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP) grant. The training will provide an overview of the federal regulations for grants and how they apply to the State Court Administrative Office and the courts. It will also provide an overview of grant reporting requirements for courts receiving federal grant funding through the SCAO.
